GENERAL ORDER OF THE PRESIDING JUDGE

The County of San Bernardino is geographically large and diverse. The Superior Court of San Bernardino County operates numerous courthouses, many of which serve geographically distant and relatively small populations.

The Superior Court of San Bernardino County is and historically has been understaffed as to judicial officers. The Court currently has one of the highest caseloads per judge ratio in the state.

In order to deal with its ever-increasing caseload and to serve the public, the Superior Court has historically heavily relied on attorneys serving as temporary judges. This is especially true in volume calendars such as probate, family law, unlawful detainers, small claims and traffic.

The limitations of California Rules of Court, rule 2.818(b) would place undue hardship on the court's ability to recruit sufficient numbers of temporary judges to adequately serve the public.

Based on the above, the Court finds there is good cause to waive the limitations in Rule 2.818(b)(1)-(3). This waiver applies to all matters heard by temporary judges in

San Bernardino County. The waiver under Rule 2.818(b)(1) is conditional. An attorney appointed as a temporary judge may only appear as an attorney or as a party on the same day in the same courthouse if the attorney's temporary judge assignment has concluded for that day.

This waiver is subject to the other grounds for limitation or disqualification as set forth in the California Code of Judicial Ethics, California Rules of Court, rule 2.818(c)(2), and California Code of Civil Procedure sections 170.1 *et seq*.

This Order is effective April 19, 2024, and supersedes all previous general orders entitled *General Order Waiving Limitations for Temporary Judges in Family Law, Probate, Unlawful Detainer, Small Claims, and Traffic Cases,* issued by previous Presiding Judges. This order shall remain in effect until December 31, 2025.
